Annual "No Pressure" Tournament Scheduled This Coming Sunday

he club's annual random triplets tournament, planned especially for pétanque newcomers, is all set for this Sunday, May 5.

Originally planned for May 26, the date was changed by the board of directors in order to avoid a scheduling conflict with the national men's triplets competition taking place that same weekend in Menlo Park.

One of the club's most popular events of the year, the VOMPC Newcomers' Tournament is organized so that each team includes at least one beginner—new to pétanque.

This mixes beginners with club regulars. It takes the pressure off. And it offers anybody who's ever been curious about pétanque an ideal chance to come learn the game, meet some friendly pétanque people and have a rousing good time.


Earlier Registration This Year

Court Surface Changes Proposed by Committee

May 9 Membership Meeting Scheduled To Review Committee Recommendations

new proposal to further upgrade the surface of our Valley of the Moon pétanque courts was issued this week by the club's 1996 grounds committee.

According to Frank Barsocchini, a leading member of the group, the final plan divides into two parts:

- 1.) It was agreed to leave the lower court (closest to the bench) as is. However, some bare spots on the playing surface will be covered with a small amount of gravel to match overall lower court conditions.
- **2.)** It was agreed to cover the upper or northern court with a liberal amount of small gravel (1/8" or less).

The purpose of the gravel is to provide VOMPC members with a challenging surface that hopefully will help them to improve their skills—especially shooting.

An open meeting to discuss the committee's proposals will be held at our Valley of the Moon pétanque courts Thursday, May 9. 5:30 p.m. This meeting will give interested **VOMPC** members chance to review details the plan with committee members. voice their opinions, and have a say in the decision on type gravel to be applied.

The special grounds committee was named earlier this year. The VOMPC board asked the committee to evaluate various ideas and to recommend any club action on what has been a long-standing question among members:

What kind of playing surface do we want on our Valley of the Moon pétanque courts?

THE UMPIRE'S CORNER

A longtime member of the club told me that at the start of a match, you toss the cochonnet out first—and then draw a circle on the terrain.

I'm a new member of the club and new to the game. So I didn't question his advice. But it doesn't make sense to me. If you don't draw the circle on the ground first, how can you tell if your throw is 6 to 10 meters from the nearest edge of the circle?



Good question. The fact is, you received bad advice.

At the start of a match, a player on the team winning the coin toss draws a circle on the ground. Then, and only then, does a player on that team toss the cochonnet, while standing with both feet inside the circle.
