One is an open random triplets event. The other is a select doubles tournament, exclusively for those FPUSA competitors eliminated on Saturday.


Entry fee for each of these "other" tournaments is \$7 per person. Registration runs 9:30-10 a.m.

The Legacy of Pétanque

More than a thousand words unfold around our picnic table, as I draw for you a mental picture.

Imagine the shady, dusty place of a village anywhere in Corsica or Provence. In the center, the water fountain finally covers the constant cry of the cigales. The afternoon grows older. The light cools down.

School is out. Kids are roaming, teenagers are courting. The café is full. The church is empty, its massive doors wide open in expectation of the cooler air and a few old black-dressed widows.

Everyone is cooling, breathing again.

Imagine now the old right-wing mayor, his younger communist opponent, the priest, the school teacher, the town drunk (still standing at this point) and other characters pacing around, *boules* in their hands. This is pétanque time. The Forum.

Kids are having their own game in a corner. The "notables" are playing the best court. That's the one closest to the gallerie: the Café du Commerce terrace where *pastis* is being served.

This is the nightly dance everyone has learned since birth. Mothers are sitting on benches attending their latest, breathing for a few minutes before the 8 p.m. dinner. They keep a discreet eye on the events around the place.

Once in awhile an argument bursts out somewhere. Quick glances are thrown, a few eyebrows raised, good wit shoots back and the case is over. It's only about a point, a missed shot, lousy pointing—nothing serious. Sighs of relief, understanding smiles are exchanged. In serious cases, the entire galerie, the ultimate judge, bursts in laughter or boos. Like the passing of a loud truck, we know it's temporary, unimportant but annoying and it won't last long.

It's been that way for years. Who would dare to challenge it?

The pétanque court is the water hole of the animals of the savanna in the diversified community in which we live. It's a need for all players, a truce in our everyday life, a time for anyone to co-exist, to be accepted, tolerated and not feel threatened.

If you can imagine the court again that afternoon, you might even see Mattei's son playing silently with Agostini's. Their families have not spoken to each other for generations for reasons they do not even remember.

I love to go to any pétanque court in France or in Sonoma and mix with people around the water hole. (*Pastis* is OK, too). Nobody is my predator. I do not have to be anybody's predator. The mix there is erratic, weird and loose and I cannot find that in any other social event.

It's a place where we can give a chance to tolerance, acceptance of anyone's weaknesses and recognition of talent. Everyone is to gain for their own reasons.

It's just a game, with little rules and no "Ruler." Winning by points is only a small part of it. Let's help everybody to raise the challenge of this game: *Tolerance*..

Think about it..
