- 2. The VOMPC membership agrees that it will not tolerate foul or abusive behavior, discourtesy, excessive arguing, belligerence, or any other offensive behavior which detracts from the civil and genial atmosphere of our club.

More Picnics ... Please

icture a lazy afternoon, some wine in your belly, good talk, and all the while playing a game that allows it all to happen simultaneously. Pétanque is what you will picture. There are few sports that embody such a civilized and healthful marriage of my hobbies.

After playing pétanque for several years, however, I have developed a competitive urge that creeps out of its hole occasionally and must be satisfied before the social harmony returns.

Trying to create an ideal mix between the recreational side and the competitive side of this sport can be a puzzling and difficult exercise. Ideally, both should occur at the same time. More and more, though, I find myself on one side of the fence or the other—enjoying both equally.

As the solution to this problem, should we hold both *mêlées* and select tournaments simultaneously? Or, should we continue with a monthly, staggered schedule?

Somebody has suggested an **A** and **B** tournament. Under this plan, players who wanted to satisfy their keen, competitive drive would fork up the dollars and play the **A** tournament that Sunday—while those who wanted only

a relaxing day of pétanque would enter the **B** side of the tournament.

Then, there is the format that has stood the test of time in France: direct elimination. The advantages are many. However, if you start poorly you could be eating lunch before noon.

A third option might be to concentrate more on the culinary aspects of pétanque. Those wishing to enjoy a good meal outdoors and play a few games of pétanque could do both and still be home for that afternoon nap—while those wishing to fill their stomachs and their wallets, if skillful enough, could satisfy their competitive desires by playing money games.

In my case, pétanque is the perfect blend of sport and relaxation. And I believe that when we discover the correct format for Sundays at the court, pétanque will flourish.

I don't believe we need large purses for pétanque to grow, although occasionally they are fun. Nor do we need membership drives for faster growth. What will create growth is the proper format ... and I believe a relaxing weekend day enjoying good food, a little wine or *pastisse* and a few games of pétanque *is* that format.



THE UMPIRE'S CORNER...

Today, I shot my opponent's first boule far out of bounds. But my boule went out of bounds, too. No boules remained on the court. My question: When that happens, who plays the next boule?

When your boule went out of bounds, it became invalid. Out of play. So with no boules on the court, your opponent, who tossed the first boule, would play again.



VOMPC "Code of Conduct" Wins Strong Endorsement

Now in Effect at Pétanque Courts

he Code of Conduct, endorsed unanimously by VOMPC directors and recommended to the full VOMPC membership, won approval in the club's annual election by an overwhelming margin of 98 percent

Such a landslide victory demonstrates the strength of our members' commitment to maintaining a civil and genial atmosphere on the Valley of the Moon pétanque courts.

Proposals for such a code came from several members after three embarrassing incidents of abusive behavior during summer tournaments.

Now a part of the club's official bylaws, the VOMPC *Code of Conduct* includes both penalties and procedures for the board of directors to follow in considering action against any overt, offensive behavior on the pétanque courts.

MAURICE EBOLLITO


Maurice Ebollito died in September, after a two-year battle with cancer.
