

On an aerial shot, my final boule landed a foot out from the target. But it knocked a gravel chip into the cochonnet, moving it just enough to give me the point with my first boule.

"I have the point," I said.
"No, no," my opponent
yelled. "The cochonnet was
moved accidentally by a
moving object, so you have
to put it back in place. It's
not your point."

What do you do?

If the cochonnet's position was marked, you move it back to its original position.
Otherwise, it stays in the new spot where the chip hit it. And you measure the point from there.

City Council OKs VOMPC Court Plans

Designs Approved for Courtside Facilities

y unanimous vote, the Sonoma City Council at its February 18 meeting approved our design plans for further improvements at the Valley of the Moon Pétanque Courts.

Plans call for a sunshade trellis on the south side of the courts and additional rammed earth benches by MaTerre, along with a permanent barbecue-oven as a future centerpiece for club picnics.

On the heels of earlier meetings between VOMPC President Tom Bricca and Public Works Director Mike Moore, the VOMPC plans sailed through the city council with firm recommendations from city staff.

Of special significance, the city council also accepted a public works proposal to develop a lease arrangement that will commit land use, and give the VOMPC long-term responsibility for the Sonoma courts and adjacent area.

Tom Bricca, Byron Mayo, Mike Norton and Frank Pipal represented the VOMPC at the council meeting.

Tom followed up the city staff report with a brief presentation, inviting council members to come out to the courts and let us introduce them to the joys of pétanque.



What Happens if it Rains?

Select Doubles Tournament Coming Aug. 1


'Sonoma Open Masters' Replaces *Vauclusien*
