




included Peter Mathis and Holly Sammons (3rd Place) and Glory Glover and PJ Mallette (4th).



"Well they often call him Speed-O..." but Mr. Earl slow-cooked this feast over the weekend, then served it up for hungry clubbers with delight.




Newcomer Hans Kurz shows veteran concentration as he plays for the point.

#### **Attention: Shooters!**

At a recent tournament a few people witnessed a 'near miss' between a hard shot going over the retaining board and a spectator's shin!

Luckily, the boule struck harmlessly into the rammed earth base of the bench and the startled spectator prudently moved to a safer vantage point. No one was hurt but this points to some precautions we all should take on and around the courts. While pétanque is, by and large, a very safe activity for everyone, steel balls flying through the air can be dangerous.

So.....

If you are a shooter, please make sure that the area near your target is clear of spectators, pets, glass objects, etc. This is especially true if your style is to shoot very hard.

If you are a team captain (or a teammate) be attentive to your surroundings. Alert other players or spectators of an impending shot.

If you are a spectator, be aware of the games in your vicinity and stay out of harm's way. Also, please keep a close eye on small children or pets who may wander into an undesirable location.

And Thanks for keeping our courts safe!

#### 09.20.01

Treasurer's Report: Balance as of 8/31/: \$5,348.

Communications Report (E.Porto): \$299.36 spent on most recent newsletter, photo albums and binders for news clippings.

Court Maintenance (B.Carter): Picnic tables need to be fixed to the ground. \$100 approved, work to be completed within 30 days.

MaTerre/VOMPC Club Championship to be held on 9/23. The format will be a pot-luck plus a \$5 per person donation to partake with proceeds going to disaster relief funds.

Insurance Update: Misuraca will continue to explore insurance coverage and report to the Board.

Special committee formed (Misuraca, Ellis and Dave Riffo) to review conduct issues on 9.02.01. The committee will report back to the Board.

Petition submitted (Teri Sirico/Ed Porto) for shade trees on the south court at no cost to the Club. Board voted unanimously to approve the trees.

The year 2001 has certainly been a great one for the VOMPC. We can all be proud of our accomplishments and all signs point to a bright future for our Club.

#### **Memberships**

The current count of 172 members matches last year's total but includes less late season and "gift" memberships. Female membership stands at 61 and continues to grow. Though more improvement can be made at the junior level, there has been increased youth participation at the courts.

#### **Tournaments**

This year the VOMPC expanded its offerings once again and showed continued creativity in tournament formats. An extra Triplette was added in February; the Mixed Doubles continued a tradition begun last year; and the new Mixed Triples format for the MaTerre Club Championship truly reflected the gender makeup of our club. But the biggest single event came on Labor Day weekend when ninetynine boulists from around the country competed in the World Championship Qualifiers and the Sonoma Cup Tournaments. No grander event was ever held at our courts.

#### The Gourmet Life

Again, new ground was broken with a full range of talent in the club stepping up to create delight after culinary delight. From soups and sausages in the winter to traditional barbeques, to couscous, boulliabaisse, paella and abalone to the great Italian dinner at Ravenswood and finishing with the Choucroute Garnie in October, our offerings consistently showed a tireless commitment to excellence on the part of our volunteers. And Thai cuisine at the Annual Banquet was a refreshing and fitting finale to our tradition of breaking bread together.

#### Leagues

While leagues have been growing in popularity over the past couple of

While we wish that pétanque was on the list of Special Olympics sports, the ability of our organization to contribute time and energy to this worthy cause made us all proud. In another instance, our Club seized the moment for another needy cause: September 11th disaster relief. In many smaller ways our members "gave back" this year-from a courtside wedding celebration, to cards and well-wishes to fellow members in hospital to spontaneous drives to help members in need.

#### **Thank You**

Of course, no single person is responsible for all the good things we have accomplished this past year. All our events are group efforts and require the time and generosity from many members. But, no single person did more to make this year the stunning success that it was than Frank Pipal, 2001 President of the VOMPC.
